Oklahoma Prevention Needs Assessment

FAQs for Parents/Guardians of Virtual Students

What is the Oklahoma Prevention Needs Assessment?	 Known as the "OPNA", the Oklahoma Prevention Needs Assessment is a biennial survey of public, private, and charter school students in the 6th, 8th, 10th, and 12th grades and is required by HB1103. The survey is a project of the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (ODMHSAS), and has been conducted in Oklahoma since 2004 and is available for students to take either English or Spanish.
What is the purpose of the survey?	The OPNA is designed for the purpose of improving student mental health and substance abuse outcomes. Questions address a variety of issues including: Alcohol Tobacco Other drug use Mental illness Academic failure Violence
	 Survey data can assist school districts with measuring the overall effectiveness of current prevention and intervention efforts and identify areas of additional need.
Are students required to participate in the survey?	Students are NOT required to participate in the survey and parents/guardians will have multiple opportunities to notify school staff of their choice to opt their student into taking the survey.
	Communication to all 6th, 8th, 10th, and 12th grade virtual parents/guardians about the OPNA will be sent during the weeks of November 20th, and 27th and December 4th.
	 Parents/Guardians choosing to opt their student into the survey will have until November 29th to notify the virtual school staff.
Is it possible to review the survey questions beforehand?	Copies of the survey instruments can be viewed by clicking here.
Are survey submissions anonymous?	The OPNA survey does not ask for students' names or any identifying information.
	The surveys are electronic and distributed through an anonymous link on a secure web-based platform and submitted directly back to the survey contractor, Oklahoma State University Center for Family Resilience.
	When completing the survey, students will be arranged so their responses cannot be seen by the employee administering the survey or by any peers.

	Results will be generated on several levels, including state, county, school district, and school.
How will survey results be made available and to whom?	 State and county-level results will be made available to the public via the OPNA Data Query System Dashboard which can be accessed here.
	District and school-specific data will be available to district leaders via a secure online portal.
